#### **Handel's Coronation Anthems**

Many composers have written coronation anthems. However, the best known were composed by George Frideric Handel (1685-1759) for the coronation of the British monarch. Handel's four Coronation Anthems were originally commissioned for the coronation of George II of Great Britain but have become standard for later coronations. They are Zadok the Priest, The King Shall Rejoice, Let Thy Hand Be Strengthened, and My Heart Is Inditing. (On tonight's program we will only perform two of the Coronation Anthems: Zadok the Priest and The King Shall Rejoice.)

The texts of all four anthems were picked by Handel — a personal selection from the most accessible account of an earlier coronation, that of James II of England in 1685. One of George I of Great Britain's last acts before his death in 1727 was to sign an "Act of Naturalization of George Frideric Handel." Handel's first commission as a newly naturalized British subject was to write the music for the coronation of George II of Great Britain and Queen Caroline which took place on October 11 the same year.

Zadok the Priest is thought to have been composed between September 9 and October 11, 1727. The text of Zadok the Priest is derived from the biblical account of the anointing of Solomon by Zadok and Nathan and the people's rejoicing at this event. These words have been used in every English coronation since that of King Edgar at Bath Abbey in 973, and Handel's setting has been used at every British coronation since 1727. The music prepares a surprise in its orchestral introduction through the use of static layering of soft string textures, followed by a sudden rousing forte tutti entrance. The chorus ends with a largo plagal cadence on the word "Hallelujah."

The King Shall Rejoice is thought to have been composed between September 9 and October 11, 1727. Taking the text from Psalm 21 (verses 1-3, 5), this movement is full of festive pomp and fanfares, with a long ritornello of the introduction, using the full force of the choir and orchestra.



#### Joy to the World!

This popular carol was penned by English writer Isaac Watts. It was first published in *The Psalms of David*, a book of hymns and spiritual songs by Watts, in 1719.

Today, it's so popular that – as of the late  $20^{\rm th}$  century –it was the most published Christmas carol in North America.

The melody most widely paired with Watts' text is 'Antioch", a tune often attributed to George Frideric Handel or Lowell Mason, a key figure in American church music.

In reality, 'Antioch' had been around in England for several years before Mason published it in the United States – but he was the first to pair it with Watts' text. Mason made a few changes to the tune – namely to the opening descending scale and its upward return – and credited it as "arranged from Handel", as it bears resemblance to some passages in Handel's Messiah. If you listen carefully, you can hear the first four notes of Joy to the World are the same as the first four in the chorus Lift Up Your Heads, while the third line of the song can be heard in aria Comfort Ye.
