

Saivi Gadi Vocalist

Saivi Gadi is currently a junior at MICDS and has been learning both Carnatic vocal music and western violin. She started learning Carnatic Music at the age of six and is currently learning from Guru Padma Shankar and Guru Mala Gopinathan. Saivi has

also completed a four-year Carnatic Vocal certification course through Potti Sreeramulu University based in California, in which she received the highest category--Distinguished--in both practical and theoretical exams. Saivi has been learning violin for seven years and has been part of the MICDS orchestra program since eighth grade. Overall, music is an integral aspect in her life, and she hopes to continue learning both forms of music in the future.

Carnatic music, or *Karnāțaka saṅgītam* is a genre of Indian classical music that evolved from ancient Hindu texts and traditions. The main emphasis in Carnatic music is on the voice, with most compositions intending to be sung. Tonight's song, *Raghuvamsha Sudha* by Patnam Subramaniam Iyer, is a popular *kriti* (composition) praising Lord Rama in the Sanskrit language. One of the primary elements of Carnatic music, the *swara*, or solfege syllables "sa-ri-ga-ma-pa-da-ni," can be clearly heard in *Raghuvamsha Sudha*, with Saivi doubling the speed each time she sings them.



Guru Prasanna Kasthuri *Mrudangam*

Prasanna Kasthuri learned Mrudangam under Guru B R Seshadri from 1985 - 90. His interest in Mrudangam was rekindled after visits of Mrudangists such as Balu and Ramesh Ramalingappa his dance projects. to Prasanna has been following of the tradition the Umayalapuram Sivaraman technique since 2015. He is

an ardent follower of his melodic Mrudangam playing.

Prasanna Kasthuri learned Carnatic Vocal music from Shakuntala, a devoted music teacher in Yeshawanthapura from 1977-80. He later continued under Guru Mattur Shankara murthy, where he completed his state exams under him. Due to distances, he moved to another legendary vocalist – Vidwan Chintalapalli Krishnamurthy to understand the depths of alaapanams and swaras. He also undertook lessons with Guru Ambi Bhagavathar – a student of doyen of music Chembai Vaidyanatha Bhagavatar.

Guru Kasthuri took lessons from Dr. Nagamani Srinath and Ustad Imrat Khan saab for short durations. He had given several concerts with all these teaches in many Sabhas in Bengaluru. He used most of his knowledge in creating more dance works of his own. He has composed music to more than 15 dance dramas and created more than 35 compositions such as swarajatis, Varnam, padams, Keertanam and tillanams.
